RETURN TO OPEN SESSION – 7:30 p.m.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA – Motion by Councilman Olson, second by Councilwoman Kash to approve the agenda with moving Ordinance 13-2019 and discussion of second egress for East Brookwood up to after approval of agenda. All members were in favor. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE – 2nd Reading/Public Hearing

Ordinance 13-2019 - An Ordinance Amending Chapter 211 Stormwater Control of the Township of Byram Code

Purpose Statement: The purpose of this ordinance is to add suggested language for Highlands-specific amendments to the existing municipal Stormwater Control Ordinance

Motion by Councilman Olson, second by Councilwoman Kash to adopt the ordinance.

Engineer Cory Stoner was present to explain this ordinance. This ordinance adds specific language to our existing ordinance in accordance with the Highlands Regional Master Plan. These are for projects considered non-exempt. Exempt means they are either less than ¼ acre of disturbance or properties that qualify for a highland’s exemption. A water deficit means that there is more water coming out of the ground than going into the ground. Most areas in Byram that have water deficits are along our perimeters. This ordinance places more requirements on non-exempt properties. It would only be applicable to a small number of properties in Byram. The preparation of this ordinance was funded by the Plan Conformance Grant from the Highlands. In addition, Cory Stoner updated Byram’s stormwater management plan which will be presented to the Planning Board at the next meeting. Scott stated that this ordinance was presented to the Planning Board at the last meeting, and Cory was there to explain it.

Mayor Rubenstein opened to the public. Carlos Luaces, 7 Johnson Blvd., stated that all the towns surrounding us have sewers which is contributing to the water deficit. Carlos asked why are we being penalized. Scott disagreed with the

statement. Andover Township and the Lake Mohawk area of Sparta do not have sewers. Harvey asked if there were any alternatives for the town being in the Highlands rule. Cory stated that we would still have to comply with Highlands, whether this ordinance is in place or not. Tom said that if you do not comply with the Highlands Act, the state can take away zoning from the town. The Highlands Act by establishing the confines of the preservation area, the state of NJ is using these standards to preserve. Tom reviewed types of extension. This is an additional regulation on something that is already regulated. All of the development projects that have come before the Planning Board have shown that they are exempt from the Highlands. The municipality can review and approve exemptions and make applicability determinations which allows the process to move quickly. Mayor Rubenstein closed to the public.

Mayor Rubenstein asked the clerk to call the vote.

Be It Resolved that Ordinance 13-2019 is passed on final reading and that a notice of final passage be published in the official designated newspaper according to the law.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION - Secondary Egress for East Brookwood

Engineer Cory Stoner was asked to provide a proposal for an alternate access to the East Brookwood neighborhood. Cory stated that there isn't an alternate access out of E. Brookwood now because it isn't easy to make one.

Cory talked about the environmental constraints and multiple NJDEP permits that would be needed, which will make this project extremely expensive. It is not a guarantee that the permits would be issued. Cory could do an analysis of each alternative, with pros and cons, and a cost analysis. He can do in a matrix format or report format.

Harvey thinks the way it sits today isn't what anyone would want. He understands the impact to the 3 approaches. He asked if there was a way to engage with the community to see what their thoughts.

Councilman Olson, second by Councilwoman Kash to open to the public.

Jack Moran, 7 East Waterloo Road, asked if Cory was talking about a gravel or paved road. Cory stated that one of the options was connecting into the Acorn Street Jug Handle. We would have to decide if it would be one way, or just used for emergency. Jack asked if there were any waivers for safety. Tom Collins stated that because it is in the preservation area, it would need a Highlands Council permit, which is rarely ever granted. Jack asked if Brookwood Drive and Brookwood Road could be connected at the end. Alex asked about the Mansfield Drive extension, and Tom stated that it is an old road return from Dover to Newton. Alex asked if this would help with permits, and Tom stated that it could.

George Shivas, 361 Amity Road, stated that he feels a second entrance is definitely needed. He has been on the planning board for a long time and has pushed to develop the Mansfield Extension for a long time.

Motion by Councilman Olson, second by Councilwoman Kash, to close to the public.

Scott stated that if the Mansfield Extension is considered, it would need to be plowed all winter. Alex stated that he has walked the Mansfield Bike Path and the roadway would need to be enhanced tremendously for emergency vehicles. We would need to determine how the access would be used.

Joe stated that you need to look at having underground utilities on Brookwood Road. A road closure would occur if a tree falls and brings down wires. If there are no wires, roads could be opened quickly

Consensus of the council was to have Joe work with Cory and revise the proposal and bring it back at a future meeting.

MANAGER AND COUNCIL REPORTS

Manager's Report: The Manager reported that counseling services were set up at the firehouse to the first responders who were involved in the fatal accident on Monday.

Mayor Rubenstein – The Mayor thanked the Police Department and all first responders for their involvement in the horrible tragedy that occurred in Stanhope on Monday.

Harvey Roseff – Attended Andover’s Council meeting and gave them an update on our meeting. He felt that personally he could provide them with a first person account of what happened at Byram’s last council meeting.

Councilman Olson – September 19th Planning Board meeting - LED discussion and public hearing on Stormwater Management Plan. Scott thanked Pete Zabita and all the first responders. He also thanked for Pete for setting up counseling sessions. Scott stated that there is a lot of misinformation out there. Patrick Colligan, President of the State PBA, had some discussion with Council members. Scott explained the procedures involved with resolutions and ordinances and stated that we have to make a motion in order to discuss it. Scott felt that the Council made a mistake to move forward with the resolution, and he is proud that we corrected the mistake by rescinding the motion.

Councilman Olson read an email that he received that he was in total disagreement with. Councilman Olson stands behind that good governance is not cheap governance.

Councilwoman Kash - No report

Public Participation 1 - Motion by Councilman Olson, second by Councilwoman Kash to open to the public.

George Shivas, 361 Amity Road, talked about the house that was burned down on 367 Amity Road over 4 years ago. George said in Sparta there was a house that was burned down and 2-3 months later it was demolished and rebuilt and today it’s a nice home with green grass. George stated that another car has appeared on the lot and there was someone sleeping in it. Tom Collins stated that the judge has entered a fine against the owner of the property, and the Township has done everything they can do. He stated that citizens can file their own complaints with the court. Joe stated that the town has issued new summons on 367 Amity and 10 Johnson Road.

Carlos Luaces, 7 Johnson Blvd., stated that Wayne Alvarez now resides at 10 Johnson Blvd. and the property is a mess. Carlos feels Wayne Alvarez is a threat to the neighborhood. Carlos stated that the Council could amend the property maintenance ordinance could to be more stringent. Alex asked if Tom could recommend any changes to the property maintenance to give the Township more authority. Joe stated that the Township is doing everything possible and stated that he has a problem with the court system. The latest set of summonses were dismissed because they were issued to the Estate of Dolores Alvarez. Nine new summons were issued.

Brian Antonik, 363 Amity Road, stated that he lives next to 367 Amity which is an awful mess. He would like to take this to a higher level. Brian stated that we need to have a new judge.

Tony Gilbert, 369 Amity Road, stated that it is a quality of life issue, and it’s been going on for many, many years. He went to various courts with his neighbors and watched Wayne Alvarez play the system. He doesn’t feel this would go on in Sparta. He would like to see action taken.

Carlos Luaces, 7 Johnson Blvd., stated that the Byram Police have been very helpful in handling his complaints against Wayne. He stated that Wayne has a mental health problem.

Joe explained that there was a house in West Brookwood that we went through the process of putting a lien on the property which resulted in costing the taxpayers of Byram \$80,000. We are finally foreclosing on the property, but we will not be able to recoup this cost.

Sarah Gyiraszy, 20 Joan Drive, talked about the request from 4 neighbors for Byram to take over their section of Joan Drive. She received the response from the township referring to the driveway agreement. She stated that this agreement was not being presented to any of the recent owners at time of sale. Tom Collins stated that

the driveway agreement was recorded in the County and it is a matter of law. She was advised to talk to the closing attorney – it is a private rights matter.

Skip Danielson, 18 Hunter Lane, thanked Councilman Olson for the comments he made tonight about the Police Department. He would like to have some thoughts and prayers for court for his daughter-in-law’s workers compensation case this Friday. Skip also questioned Resolution 195-2019, and the stipulation that a full-time employee who has served less than one year shall not be entitled to paid leave but shall be granted non-paid military leave without loss of time. Joe Sabatini stated that he reviewed this with the attorney.

Todd Sodano, police officer from Byram Township, commented on Harvey Roseff’s facebook posts, which stated “request a study to deliver efficient and effective services”. Todd asked what is inefficient and ineffective about their police force now. Harvey stated that he never said that Byram’s police force was inefficient and ineffective. Harvey did say services can always get better. Todd asked if Byram was inefficient and ineffective yesterday during the tragedy, and he asked what is wrong with their department now. Harvey believes that consolidation is better for a community. He said we may end up with more feet on the street with less overhead. Todd stated that he would be a rubber stamp study.

Jeannie Moran, 7 East Waterloo Road, stated that there wasn’t protocol at the last meeting—a lot of rules were broken. She thought having a study was a good idea, because maybe we would find a way to have our taxes go down not because she didn’t think we had a good police department. She would like to see protocol going forward that is fair to everyone.

Councilman Olson, second by Councilwoman Kash closed to the public.

BE IT RESOLVED, that said Ordinance shall be further considered for final passage at the meeting of the Township Council of the Township of Byram on October 1st at 7:30 p.m. at the Municipal Building, 10 Mansfield Drive, Byram Township, at which time and place all persons interested shall be given an opportunity to be heard.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

Energy Aggregation – The Mayor stated that we had two presentations on energy aggregation. Alex originally was not in favor of this because he felt that government should not get involved. The majority of residents don't get involved in third party providers, but some may have signed up with a telemarketer with the promise of lower cost, but than the 2nd year the price goes up.

The Township does not benefit from the program. Scott Olson stated that he is totally against this. He is against the Township telling people who will provide their electric. He would be supportive of a program that would allow people to opt in, but he doesn't want people to be automatically put in and then have to opt out. Scott would want this to go to referendum first if the Council wanted to consider this option. Nisha Kash is not in favor of this. Harvey stated that February is the trigger date for the auction which wouldn't line up with a referendum. We would have to skip a year before we could sign on to it. Harvey said we should look at how we compare to JCP&L.

Richard Schneider, River Road, asked if he gets a letter and he doesn't respond, what happens. Alex said a resident would be put in if he doesn't respond and then you would have to opt out.

Jack Moran, 7 East Waterloo Road, commented on this program and felt it was something beneficial.

It was decided that we will table this to the next meeting and discuss it when Councilman Gray is present. Scott Olson suggested looking at the process and get a timetable of how it unfolds. We can let Gable know that we are considering them, and we may have them back for another meeting.

Scenic Byway – Scott Olson spoke with Greg Poff last week, and he reported that the County was never contacted about it. Scott will speak to them about this. Frank Gonzalez is interested in being a representative. Alex suggested having people send in a letter of interest.

FUTURE AGENDA DISCUSSION ITEMS

Alex stated that we are adding this item to this and future agendas so that we can discuss as a group if we want something to be a topic. If added to a future agenda, backup to the topic would be provided by the council member who asked for discussion, and the Manager would also investigate.

Harvey stated that we set up a fleet management committee to review establishing a program. We had two approaches established 6 months ago. Harvey would like a discussion for selecting one of the approaches. Scott did not think this needed to get discussed. Harvey would like to have some guidelines on the usage of the cars. Joe stated that police cars have a 10-year cycle. It starts as a patrol car and ends as a side car. We have had a model that has worked well over the years. Joe doesn't feel the cars that we buy now have the quality that cars had years ago. The plan was to buy one car a year and every 4 years buy 2 cars--and this works well. We put \$45,000 in the budget this year to purchase a police car. We also purchased much needed admin cars. Alex is of the opinion that the Council does not need to manage this. Nisha and Scott agreed.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION II

Motion by Councilman Olson, second by Councilwoman Kash, to open to the public.

Skip Danielson, 18 Hunter Lane, asked if the Mayor and Council has taken a position on the Highlands Enterprise Zone. The Mayor stated that he hasn't had time to review it yet, but he will be spending time on it soon. Skip stated that he would like to see support for this.

Joe stated that he is having a meeting with Dave Romano on Monday to continue discussing the financial aspect of a leasing option for a municipal building.

Joanne Smith, 57 Lake Drive, was surprised and happy that the tennis courts got done so quickly.

Anneliese Tartell, 69 North Shore Road, thanked Joe Sabatini and Scott Olson for what they said this evening. Anneliese asked if a Council person is allowed to attend another town's council meeting and speak. She didn't think what was said at Andover was appropriate. Alex stated that any council person can speak in another municipality because of first amendment rights. Anneliese said that the resolution stated that an implementation plan would be done. Alex stated that it was never about disbanding the police department, it was only doing a study.

Harvey feels depriving the study is wrong. Harvey stated that he was sorry that the police department was told at the last minute and stated that he wasn't aware of that.

Alex says that he has learned in business that gathering information is a good thing.

Anneliese asked for an update on Quick Chek. Alex stated that the property has closed, and demo should start shortly. WaWa went to the ARC committee and may be coming to the planning board next month.

Todd Sodano read an email from the DCA and Rick stated that the study would be done in 60 days and the plan could be implemented by January 1, 2020. Todd stated that Harvey's post makes it sound like he is saying that Byram is not effective and efficient. Harvey apologized if his statement was interpreted that way, because that wasn't what he meant. Todd felt if it isn't broken why fix it. Todd feels our Police Department runs great. The response time is fantastic. Alex stated that consolidation is talked about everywhere, in the state, county, local, and schools. Todd agreed but stated there is a better way to go about it, which would start with including the Police Department.

Stacy Olivo D'Onofrio, 9 Oak Trail, stated that Harvey said tonight that he would like to include the East Brookwood residents in the discussion about the second egress, and she asked why the Council didn't give the Police the same respect.

Alex stated that his intent was if the study was going to recommend consolidation of the two police departments, he was going to ask that a referendum be put on the ballot and let the people vote on it. Alex said that PBA president stated at the end of the meeting he could assist the Council with a study, which would be a much more accurate study than the State would provide.

John D'Onofrio asked if Byram has an identity. John felt that the police department is Byram's identity. Alex stated that Byram has an identity of being rural, and filled with people who love Byram, along with the police department also being

an identity. Todd Sodano stated that when Joe was hired, the police department was supportive of him because he grew up in Byram and they knew he cared a great deal about our town.

Bob Tierney, 274 Lackawanna Drive, commented on Alex’s email about asking when we would have the study back. It seemed that there was an urgency to do the study quickly and have it implemented by January 1, 2020. He found it strange that the State would reply that way if it wasn’t the intention of the Council to move this along quickly. Alex stated that he asked this question the weekend before the meeting so that he would have an answer for the public if asked. He never told the DCA that Byram was in a hurry and always felt this process would take quite some time to go through.

Todd Sodano expressed that the State wants consolidation and they will make sure that the study come out in the State’s favor. Todd stated that he isn’t against looking at a study, but he would want it done by an unbiased party and they want to be included.

Scott Olson stated this discussion should have been taken place months ago, but he is glad it is happening now and hope it continues.

Carlos Luaces stated that a study could not be done in 60 days.

Skip Danielson, 18 Hunter Lane, stated that over the years the Byram PD has been first on the scene for all of the homicides in Andover Borough. Skip came from a town that had less than 2 square miles and had an 18 person police department. He moved here and started with 5 police officers. Policing one community is very different than policing another community.

Jeannie Moran, 7 East Waterloo Road, stated that the Council has been apologetic tonight and listened to the public.

Motion by Councilman Olson, second by Councilwoman Kash to close to the public.
